DR. HAROLD ARLEN NAMED PRESIDENT OF THE AMERICAN RHINOLOGIC SOCIETY FOR YEAR 1990

At the 35th Annual Scientific Meeting of the American Rhinologic Society held in New Orleans, Louisiana, on September 23, 1989, Dr. Harold Arlen, South Plainfield, New Jersey, was elevated to President. Dr. Arlen has served as a member of the Board of Directors, and successively 2nd Vice-President, 1st Vice-President, President-Elect, and Course Coordinator for the past year. Dr. Arlen has a particular interest in the teaching of rhinology including diseases of the paranasal sinuses. He also has a well recognized expertise in the field of temperomandibular joint dysfunction. He is interested in developing an increased interest in the American Rhinologic Society and particularly increasing the membership stressing the established teachings of Dr. Maurice H. Cottle as well as developing new information concerning the physiology of the nose.

PRESIDENTIAL MESSAGE

I'm happy to report that the ARS is continuing to grow both in numbers and in academic achievements.

The increase in membership is necessary to keep our organization viable and in the mainstream of otorhinolaryngology. My aim is to have the teachings of the ARS searched out by all otolaryngologists.

It has been a great privilege, as President Elect, to be the Program Chairman for the past two academic meetings. It is a pleasure to report that the speakers ranged from resident phy-



sicians to the most notable of our profession. The resident contest was of special interest during the last program. Presentations were chosen from the many submitted and were very well received by the attendees.

I'm very excited by the fact that two dissection courses are in the planning stages. If they come about as planned, functional surgery will again be taught at the dissection level. Dr. Cottle was always very explicit that the ARS fulfill this need in our specialty.

A review of our last academic meeting in New Orleans would show that it was an outstanding symposium on the complications of sinus surgery. I would like to point out to all present and future members that the society is as interested in the medical and surgical treatment of the para-nasal sinuses as it is in functional nasal treatment. I believe that none of our otolaryngological societies have devoted enough time and effort to the para-nasal sinuses. This was, therefore, a need that was met by the ARS.

It is, indeed, a pleasure to report that the official journal of the American Academy of Otolaryngology - Head and Neck Surgery is also the official publication of the American Rhinologic Society. All papers presented at the meetings can, thereby, be accepted for publication when properly presented.

I invite any and all members of the Society to contact me with any ideas they may have to further the endeavors of the Society. I wish to thank the nominating committee and the membership for the honor they have bestowed upon me. It would be impossible to thank individually the members that have taught me so much about rhinology. I am happy to be an integral part of an organization that is so devoted to teaching its members and, thereby, helping patients.

THE "DR. KENNETH H. HINDERER MEMORIAL LECTURE"

1990 marks the 10th anniversary of the passing of Dr. Kenneth H. Hinderer.

To honor Dr. Hinderer's memory, a "Dr. Kenneth H. Hinderer Memorial Lecture" will be given by Dr. Fausto Lopez Infante of Mexico City, Mexico, titled "Revision Surgery of the Nasal Pyramid" at the Annual Scientific Meeting of the American Rhinologic Society on September the 8th, 1990, in San Diego.

As a young otorhinolaryngologist, after serving with the Army in WWII, Dr. Hinderer was one of the first to attend Dr. Samuel Fomon's courses in nasal surgery along with Dr. Maurice Cottle and Dr. Irving Goldman and many of the pioneers of modern rhinology. He realized then that the surgical concepts of rhinoplasty used for esthetic surgery of the nose could also be applied to the relief of nasal stenosis. This experience was to mark all his professional life. In 1954 he joined with Dr. Cottle and a few dedicated colleagues to found the American Rhinologic Society of which he became president in 1958.

In the fifties, otolaryngologists were mainly trained in the classic "submucous resection." Surgery of the pyramid was thought to be indicated for correction of cosmetic anomalies. As a matter of fact, it was common practice then to have the operation of the septum done by an otolaryngologist and later in a second stage, a rhinoplasty was performed by a plastic surgeon. Along with Dr. Cottle, Dr. Hinderer felt the need to teach the concept and techniques of functional combined surgery of the septum and pyramid for the relief of nasal obstruction. In the early sixties with the support of Dr. Raymond Jordan, Director of the Eye and Ear Hospital in Pittsburgh, Dr. Hinderer organized a one week course: "The Fundamentals of Surgery of the Nose." This course covered all aspects of the basic sciences necessary to perform physiological and functional surgery of the nasal septum and pyramid for the relief of nasal obstruction and restoration of normal external appearance. Thanks to his dedication and energy and to a superb faculty, this course presented an ideal balance between formal teaching, laboratory, live surgery and dialogue between teachers and students. For over a decade this course was one of the most respected instruments in dissemination of the concept of functional surgery of the nose to hundreds of otolaryngologists from the USA, Mexico and abroad.

Not satisfied with an excellent course manual and numerous publications, Dr. Hinderer went on to crystallize the contemporary concepts of rhinologic surgery in a textbook "Fundamentals of Anatomy and Surgery of the Nose," published by Aesculapius Publishing Company in 1970, with a second edition a few years later. In 1990, this book still remains a good reference to the global

approach to surgery of the nose and "it demonstrates that as pleasing a cosmetic result can be had when the surgery is done for the correction of respiratory deficiencies as can be secured when cosmesis is the only end in view" as noted by Dr. Henry L. Williams in the introduction.

A genuine rhinology clinician, Dr. Hinderer realized the importance of allergy as an important cause of nasal symptoms and he became one of the early members of the American Ophthalmologic and Otolaryngologic Allergy Society. He was able to give his patients of those days comprehensive rhinologic management.

Dr. Hinderer also realized the importance of "hands on" training for otolaryngologists and he initiated a fellowship in Rhinology at the University of Pittsburgh. I was fortunate to be the first beneficiary of this fellowship in 1967 and I will be forever grateful not only for his scientific teaching, but also for his influence as a clinician and wonderful human being.

Like many interested in the respiratory function of the nose, he spent considerable amount of time and energy in developing a technique to evaluate nasal resistance in the context of global respiration. Unfortunately, life proved to be too short for him to achieve his lifelong dream.

In the early days of developing rhinology, teaching courses was the principal instrument of learning and Dr. Hinderer with Dr. Cottle and many colleagues of the ARS participated in more than one hundred courses. He was attending one of the very excellent courses directed by Dr. Pat Barelli in Kansas City in 1980 when he was struck by the condition which was to take him away a few months later.

The rhinologists of today and the American Rhinologic Society owe Dr. Hinderer a great debt for his teaching and contributions to physiologic nasal surgery. To honor his memory and to promote the teaching of aerodynamics and surgery of the nose, a yearly "Dr Kenneth H. Hinderer Memorial Lecture" will be part of the Annual Scientific Meeting of our Society. For the first year, marking the 10th anniversary of Dr. Hinderer's passing, the American Rhinologic Society has gratefully received a donation from Mrs. Marion Hinderer. A "Dr. Kenneth H. Hinderer Memorial Fund" has been established for continuing this lectureship in future years and contributions can be made directly to this special fund.
